"I had some really wonderful professors at Mercer who really changed the way I saw the world," Webb says. "I decided my junior year that I wanted to pursue a career in higher education."

As an undergraduate at Mercer University, Webb was awarded several scholarships.

She also received several other scholarships through the honor societies Phi Eta Sigma and Omicron Delta Kappa.

These days, Webb is writing her dissertation for her PhD at

UNC Chapel Hill while completing a graduate fellowship in Washington in publishing.

has not forgotten where she comes from and reminisces fondly over her time at BCHS.

"Some of my favorite memories are probably from trips with the tennis team or working through the night on projects with my AP European History cohort," she recalls.

Although her stellar high school performance was the result of a collaborative effort by BCHS teachers, Webb credits one teacher in particular with igniting her love for learning.

"Without a doubt history teacher Karen Reeves has a way of making every one of her students feel like her favorite," Webb says. "She really fostered my intellectual curiosity in high school and beyond."

Webb hopes to inspire students like Reeves inspired her as she teaches classes in writing, American literature, children's literature, film analysis, and GRE and LSAT prep courses.

Although Webb's plate is pretty full these days with her academic research and responsibilities as a Teaching Fellow and PhD Candidate, she still finds a way to maintain her personal life.

"In my free time I play tennis and cook," she says. "I also love to travel'm looking forward to going to Austria in December. And, much of my free time these days has been spent wedding planning."

Webb's dissertation combines her History degree with her advanced studies in English as she creates what is known in academia as a literary history by tracing the lives of the Hentz family.

"I trace the lives and writings of popular 19th century novelist Caroline Lee Hentz;" Webb says, "her son, a physician who treated slaves; and her daughter, who moved to Brazil as part of the Confederados movement after the Civil War.
